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
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



#### From our Honorary President:



It is a very great honour to be the Honorary President of Inverness Opera Company, and on their behalf I would like to thank everyone for their continued support.

In three years time Inverness Opera Company will celebrate 40 years of excellent productions, presented in a highly polished manner. A tremendous debt of gratitude is owed to the artists who over the years carried on despite the loss of the Empire Theatre. Productions continued on the limited stage of the

Playhouse Cinema, before the disastrous fire in 1972, and thereafter in school halls until moving to Eden Court Theatre in 1977.

Tonight's very professional performance of the Gipsy Baron has required many months of rehearsal but I know the Company's reward for its efforts will be your enjoyment and appreciation of the show.



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#### The Story of 'THE GIPSY BARON'

The story is set in Zrinyi — a small village in Hungary in the first half of the 19th century. There is considerable antagonism between the village people — led by the mayor Kalman Zsupan and the gipsies encamped nearby, headed by their Queen Czipra. The villagers also live with the threat of Turkish invasion, which frequently occurs. Zsupan is a wealthy pig breeder whose "right hand man and left hand man" is Otto. The household is completed by Zsupan's man-eating daughter Arletta (for whom Otto's love is unrequited) and Mirabella the domineering housekeeper.

Zsupan's day gets off to a bad start when Queen Czipra arrives with her grand-daughter Saffi to warn him that she has had a vision wherein the son of the exiled lord on whose land Zsupan grazes his pigs, is about to return to claim his inheritance. Zsupan laughs this off. At this point, however, Count Kareska — the Civil Commissioner from Vienna arrives to announce the imminent arrival of the young nobleman — Sandor Barinkay — as was foretold. Arletta immediately sees a chance to marry someone of noble blood and rushes off to prepare herself. Sandor Barinkay enters and proclaims his intention of taking up residence on his ancestral estate. Kareska advises Zsupan of a fabulous treasure hidden in the ruins of Sandor's family home. The treasure belonged to the Turkish Pasha who last invaded the area and only Kareska knows of its location. Sandor's father was exiled and dispossessed for befriending the Turkish Pasha. The Deed of Restoration of Sandor's estate encompasses the castle and all its contents — which would include the treasure. Zsupan and Kareska thus conspire to marry off Arletta to Sandor in order to obtain a share in the treasure.

Sandor's father was a great patron of the gipsies and came to be known as the "Gipsy Baron". Sandor assures the gipsies that they are welcome to stay on his land but Zsupan's pigs are not! He also rebuffs Arletta who has pressed her suit firmly — egged on by her father, Mirabella and Kareska.

Queen Czipra presents her grand-daughter to Sandor who falls madly in love with her. They resolve to marry — but it is to be a gipsy wedding. This enrages the family and Kareska — their despair being complete when the treasure is found by the gipsies and is presented to Sandor and Saffi. Czipra startlingly reveals that Saffi is of noble blood — the result of the secret union between the Turkish Pasha and Czipra's daughter. The Pasha had told Czipra where the treasure was hidden before he died, and bade her to keep it safe for Saffi.

Graf Peter Homonoy appears with a detachment of hussars on the way to repel the Turks who have invaded once again. Virtually the whole male population is recruited into the hussars by drinking the recruiting wine and donning the shako. Otto and Zsupan unwittingly enter into the spirit of things and find themselves in the army too. Arletta and Mirabella suddenly realise that they love the two hapless recruits and plead with them to come home safely. Likewise, Sandor, who is to head the new regiment is seen off by Saffi in a touching farewell scene.

The action then moves to Vienna where the population are anxiously awaiting the return of the victorious "Romany Hussars". Kareska is upbraided by Homonoy for endeavouring to seduce Saffi, who had been left under his protection, and is relieved of his office. Zsupan and Otto enter as the "advance guard" of the hussars. Zsupan recounts his thrilling adventures to the assembled female audience — who quickly melt away when Arletta and Mirabella appear to welcome home the "wounded" heroes. Sandor marches in with the Romany Hussars and is congratulated by Homonoy who reveals that the Emperor has granted him the title of the "Gipsy Baron". Sandor is re-united with Saffi and all ends happily.

THE GIPSY BARON was first presented in Vienna on 24th October 1885 at the Theater an der Wien under the baton of Johann Strauss himself. It was previously staged by Inverness Opera Company in the Empire Theatre in 1959.

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

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
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
